## Section Notebook

At this time of year most of us are looking back and looking forward, while armchair mountaineering with our Christmas gifts.

November was an active club month with a successful showing of the award-winning films from the Banff Festival of Mountain Films, our annual general meeting with a fine presentation on the Brooks Peninsula by Richard Hebda, the publication of another Trips Issue of the Bushwhacker, and the assembly of the winter program. We also met with Ted Whalley, the A.C.C. president, December 6th in Victoria.

At the AGM on November 26 it was decided by a practically unanimous vote, that the section would like to carry on with the present executive for '82; to support the hiring of a coordinator by the Federation of Mountain Clubs of B.C. (see Vol. 9:5 p.2); and to raise section dues a little to offset increased postage and printing costs in 1982.

The financial report by Albert Hestler showed that we were healthy and the membership report

by Chris Schreiber indicated considerable growth. Greg Cousens was the only executive member who could not continue but we feel fortunate in having found Geoff Freer willing to take his place. Geoff is the senior avalanche specialist with the provincial government highways ministry.

Having looked back let us now look forward. Upcoming events are noted in this issue. For the executive, active, participative mountaineering by section members is presently a prime topic of our attention. It is my most sincere hope that we will get a regular training program going in spring, perhaps a series of weekend workshops with some designed for complete newcomers to climbing, and others as pre-season refreshers open to members with prior roped climbing experience. We have the impression that many members would come on more outings but hesitate due to inexperience or concern that they're not up to date on techniques. A series of workshops could focus on specific skills such as belaying or crevasse rescue systems.

Discussions with Ted Whalley also brought out that the main club Board is willing to study a hut proposal for the Island, as was approved in principle last spring, especially one which would not have so high a land cost as the Mt. Washington area. There have been suggestions from many of you to locate something at Buttle Lake, in Strathcona Park, which would be more central to various trails than the Mt. Washington site, and would be on a good paved road or nearby. What do you, as a section member, feel would be most useful to us, if any facility at all? Either way, I welcome your comments!

Just the other day I received a nice mountain scenery postcard with a saying by James Allen: "Follow your dreams, for as you dream so shall you become." With these wise words let me finish and wish all of you on behalf of the executive, a rewarding club year in 1982. *KH*

# Directions for '82

A brief survey was circulated at our AGM Nov. 26th, to help the executive plan our efforts for '82. Here is a summary of the results:

1. Potential Objectives of the Section, ranked from 1st to least important: 1:Organizing trips on the Island and area, 2:Conducting free/low-cost training sessions, 3:Publishing information about climbing activity and opportunities, 4:Bringing in guest speakers/slides AND developing alpine access trails on Vancouver Island, 5:Supporting alpine environmental studies through main ACC, 6:Developing alpine shelters on Van. Is.

2. How many Sundays during summer & fall would you join a trailwork party? Total: 40 (this was rather inconsistent with the vote for developing trails—we seem to want the trails if someone else will build them; several hundred man-days would be necessary).

3. Guest speakers: members felt we should operate as follows: 39% at substantial profit to enable donations to main club funds, 33% at break-even [our current level] 22% at 20% profit (savings value) 6% at a loss if necessary.

4. Senior Membership Category: We included questions here due to a lot of member enquiries (and confusion in interpreting the present wording in constitution). "Do you think that a "Senior" member should possess certain basic climbing skills, and that his/her basic competence in these skills should be formally reviewed by a Section or main club committee of Seniors?" NO:6% YES:94% of which 50% thought this should apply to new applicants only.

"Do you think Senior membership should be available in three areas of interest: Rockclimbing, Alpine Climbing, Wilderness Skiing?" NO:12% YES:78%.

5. What areas of skill development should the Section organize?

1: Basic ropework/belays, AND general mtn. skills (camping etc). 2: Glacier travel/rescue, 3:Rock-climbing, 4: X-C Skiing, 5: Mtn. tour skiing (downhill).

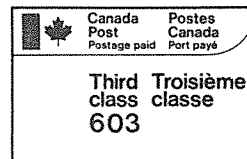
